MISSION

Our mission is to serve short term mission and study teams in travel to Liberia and Africa, and lead people into a growing relationship with Jesus Christ and strengthen the local church..

VISION

Our vision is to connect churches in Liberia with churches and organizations from the US and around the world, to provide training to leaders and lay people, and also to plant and disciple churches in unreached areas.

HISTORY OF MISSION WORK IN LIBERIA

Mission work to Liberia began in 1821 when freed slaves from the United States came to live and to share the gospel of Jesus with the people in



Liberia's 260-mile Atlantic coastline.

West Africa. In fulfilling the Great Commission, these missionaries and their families established the Providence Baptist Church in Monrovia, Liberia, in 1821 and went on to form Africa's first black independent country on July 26, 1847.

Throughout the years, the passion for spreading the good news of Christ remained fervent and

was embodied in the Liberia Baptist Missionary and Educational Convention (LBMEC), which was established in 1880. The fire for missions shone even brighter in 1976 when the Liberia Baptist Theological Seminary (LBTS), a school for men and women to receive formal education in pastoral education and evangelism in various forms, was created.

THE CONFLICTS AND MISSION WORK

In the late 1970s, riots began over conflict with the government. In 1980, Liberia experienced the first of several military coups and lived through the public execution of 13 government officials.

CONFLICTS AND MISSION WORK, cont'd

From 1980 to 2003, the country survived a horrific civil war and the controversial presidencies of Samuel K. Doe and Charles Taylor. During that period,

close to three hundred thousand people died and many others, including missionaries, fled the country. In 2014, Liberia like Sierra Leone, Guinea and Nigeria experienced the epidemic of the Ebola Virus.

Dr. Lincoln Sie Brownell, Jr., a 1984 alumnus of LBTS and missionary at heart, briefly left Liberia in 1991, but felt the call of God to return during the height of the war in 1993. Dr. Brownell was inaugurated as the first Liberian President of LBTS in 1998.

While danger was still very present and thousands were dying, Lincoln Brownell started a program called Student Home Missions, where students would seek God's guidance, stand in the face of adversity, and make advances for the kingdom by going into rural areas and evangelizing.

At its onset in 1998, 25 courageous student-missionaries went into all 15 counties of Liberia and to neighboring Sierra Leone, Guinea and Côte d'Ivoire to fulfill the Great Commission (Matt. 28:19-20).

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MISSIONS IN RURAL AREAS TODAY

The Home Missions program is still thriving today, with many
